Kylie Purbrick – Senior Years English Teacher Our Lady of the Southern Cross College, Dalby

Kylie, a dedicated and expert educator of English, employs evidence-based, high-impact strategies that affirm the dignity and potential of all students.

Her meticulous and personalised planning keeps the subject context up to date with current events and depths students' thinking by asking critical questions that encourage reflection.

Kylie also ensures content and pedagogy respond to students' cultural backgrounds and life experiences, challenging them to think deeply about their place in the world.

As a result, students remember English not just for the text or poetry they wrote, but for the rich experiences of critical thinking and engagement. It is because of this that English is considered a standout subject at the College.

Collaborating with her teaching colleagues in Year 11 to 12 English, in 2023, six out of twenty Year 12 students achieved scores above 70 out of 75 in their final QCAA, with three students scoring a perfect 75. Kylie's consistent approach, data utilisation and relational pedagogy contributed to this student success and engagement.

Melita Dellit – Year 1 Teacher Our Lady of the Southern Cross College, Dalby

In 2023, when a student with a diagnosis of Albinism joined Melita's class, she took the initiative to promote awareness of this medical condition among her students and the College community. Her efforts extended beyond the student she was teaching, inspiring the student's younger brother, who also has Albinism.

Recognising the need for equitable access to the curriculum, Melita focused on supporting this severely vision-impaired student's transition to learning Braille. She introduced Braille as an everyday teaching tool, seamlessly embedding it into various subjects. In English, she created Braille picture books for students to read, and in HASS (Humanities and Social Sciences), she introduced Louis Braille using interactive CANVAS pages.

Melita's commitment to enhancing her teaching practice led her to seek professional development sessions and collaborate with external consultants. Her genuine impact extended beyond the classroom, benefiting the entire family. Now teaching the youngest sibling, who also has Albinism, Melita's pathways have facilitated a flawless transition to Braille literacy across the College.
