Madison Spencer – Prep/Year 1 teacher St Maria Goretti School, Inglewood

Madison brings contagious energy and genuine passion to her teaching, creating a classroom environment that's both vibrant and deeply connected. Her strong bond with students is evident in the way they engage with her and with each other - often working in pairs or small groups to support one another's learning. Her lessons are interactive and hands-on, with role play used to bring real-world situations and subject content, like Religion stories, to life.

She's embraced the Diocesan Approach to Reading (DAR) and the use of Decodable Readers Australia, leading the way with innovative practices like her Fluency Pairs Routine, which was recorded by TCSO to share across the Diocese. Madison often invites students and parents to collaborate, bringing personal experiences and resources into the classroom to enrich learning and build community.

Madison's classroom is more than just a learning space - it's a welcoming hub for students across the school. She ensures it's safe and supportive for everyone, and it's not uncommon to see students from other year levels dropping by in the morning to say hello or spend time there. Her warmth, creativity, and commitment to student success make her a standout educator.

Jesse Curtis – Prep teacher Sacred Heart Primary School, Toowoomba

Jesse is a proactive and passionate educator who consistently seeks out current research and curriculum updates to strengthen her teaching practice. Well ahead of the rollout of the Diocesan Approach to Reading, she began exploring the Science of Reading, positioning herself as a leader in early years literacy. Her work with P–2 teachers has been instrumental, and she features in a video included in Diocesan resources - highlighting her role in shaping best practice across schools.

Beyond literacy, Jesse is a leading advocate for Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) and a valued contributor to ongoing school improvement. She's presented at multiple professional learning days, supported colleagues, and is always first to offer to mentor UniSQ practical experience students. Her commitment to education was recognised through her nomination to the Queensland initiative Be That Teacher, where she is currently featured on the official website.

Jesse's teaching is deeply connected to wellbeing and the Mercy Values of hospitality, integrity, compassion, and excellence. She helps students link their learning about Jesus to how they live these values in everyday life. Her transition afternoons for incoming families are tailored to the community's needs, offering a warm and informative introduction to school life.

Kathryn Lucas – Learning enrichment teacher St Patrick's School, Allora

Kathryn has played a pivotal role in strengthening early years education, particularly in the area of reading instruction. Her observations during small-group interventions, paired with research insights, have helped pinpoint key areas for improvement.

Her leadership has had a wide-reaching impact. Even before the launch of TCSO's Diocesan Approach to Reading, Kathryn was actively supporting educators across the diocese - sharing strategies, modelling effective practices, and offering guidance to a range of stakeholders. Her ability to connect theory with classroom practice has made her a trusted voice in literacy development.

Kathryn's work continues to shape how reading is taught, not just at St Patrick's School Allora, but across the broader education community. Her thoughtful, research-informed approach is helping to build stronger foundations for young learners and lasting change in early years teaching.

Peter Keightley – Secondary teacher – Maths and Science and Curriculum Leader – Humanities and Business St Joseph's College, Toowoomba

Peter is a deeply respected educator whose expertise in Maths and Science is matched by his thoughtful and approachable nature. He's known for helping students understand not just how to solve problems, but why the concepts matter - bringing clarity and meaning to learning. Through project-based learning and differentiated instruction, Peter has boosted student engagement and performance, making Maths more accessible and enjoyable for all learners.

His methodical approach to problem-solving demystifies complex ideas, and he's always exploring new ways to build conceptual understanding. Peter generously shares his strategies with colleagues, co-marking and moderating to support professional judgement and consistency. His lifelong learner mindset sets a positive tone across the Department, inspiring others to grow and reflect.

Peter's dedication goes far beyond the classroom. He volunteers for exam setup, offers Maths tutoring in the library, and actively supports early career teachers - investing in the next generation with patience and care. His readiness to step into leadership roles, combined with his kindness and deep knowledge of teaching and learning, makes him an invaluable part of St Joseph's College and the profession as a whole.

Eleanor Bradford – Secondary teacher – English and Drama St John's School. Roma

Ellie has had an extraordinary impact on the Arts at St John's School through her leadership, innovation and dedication. She founded and led the senior Drama Club as an enriching extra-curricular opportunity, fostering creativity and confidence among students. Ellie was instrumental in reintroducing Senior Drama to the curriculum, single-handedly developing units and assessments, and serving as the sole senior drama teacher.

Her commitment extended beyond the classroom, as she initiated and meticulously planned the senior Cultural Tour, offering rural students immersive experiences with professional artists in Brisbane. Ellie also engaged Queensland Theatre's 'The Scene Project', integrating it into student learning and assessment, and organised actor-led workshops that deeply enriched student engagement.

As co-director of the school's production of Disney Junior's Into The Woods, Ellie helped create a space where students felt valued and accepted. Her influence was pivotal in modelling the importance of the Arts within the school community. In 2025, she continues this legacy as co-director of The Little Mermaid, driving increased student participation and introducing Arts-themed shirts to promote pride and visibility. Ellie's tireless efforts have not only elevated the Arts at St John's but have also inspired a culture of creativity, inclusion and excellence.

Emily McKay – Year 5 teacher and Behaviour and Engagement Coordinator Our Lady of Lourdes Primary School, Toowoomba

Emily is a dedicated and inspiring educator. Since 2019, she has actively contributed to school improvement through professional learning teams and strategic project rollouts, including Lighthouse Numeracy, the Writing Improvement Strategy, and the Microsoft Transformation Project. Her efforts have enhanced academic outcomes and strengthened consistency in pedagogy across all year levels.

In 2024, Emily served as Acting Assistant Principal for three terms, where she played a key role in developing and implementing the school's Behaviour and Engagement Framework. Now leading this initiative as the Behaviour and Engagement Coordinator, she continues to support students through targeted strategies, including 1:1 re-entry support that has significantly improved engagement and learning.

Her leadership extended to Acting APRE at St Patrick's School in St George for a period of time in 2023. There she led the initial implementation of Sentral Reporting, streamlining report card systems and guiding staff through the transition.

Emily's ability to engage and inspire others is one of her most remarkable qualities. She mentors teachers, leads professional development sessions and has presented at conferences including TCS Leadership Forums, QAMT, and QELi. Her innovative thinking, data-informed practice, and strong relationships with the parish community reflect a leader who brings faith and expertise to everything she does.

James Darlington – Secondary teacher – English and Arts, Head Coach and Site Lead of Liverpool FC International Academy St Ursula's College, Toowoomba

James is a forward-thinking and deeply committed educator whose leadership spans digital innovation, sport, and cultural connection. He has significantly enhanced staff confidence and capability in ICT through targeted professional development, focusing on safe, reliable tools and ethical use. As a key driver of the College's engagement with Al, James has guided both staff and students in understanding how to access, apply, and critically evaluate Al tools. His involvement in the Toowoomba Catholic Schools Al committee has allowed him to collaborate with colleagues across the Diocese to shape future-focused, ethical practices.

Beyond the classroom, James is Head Coach and Site Lead of the Liverpool Football Club International Academy. He uses sport as a powerful platform to build resilience, respect, and ambition in young people. Under his leadership, player numbers have grown by 120%, and students have gained coaching qualifications.

A proud Kamilaroi man, James is also a passionate advocate for First Nations perspectives. He has led a review of the College's Acknowledgement of Country and actively contributes to community groups like Black Coffee and the Gungai Group, working to build intercultural understanding and meaningful connections between the College and the wider community.

Amanda also organises enriching excursions and presentations, including the Year 9 trip to the Bunya Mountains, sessions with the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation, and the QUT Science Week Hackathon. Her embrace of emerging technologies, including Al, reflects her forward-thinking approach to education. Amanda's leadership is both empathetic and empowering. She sets clear goals, sources innovative professional learning opportunities and fosters a collaborative, supportive environment for staff. Her dedication to responsive pedagogy and inclusive learning continues to inspire those around her, making her a driving force in shaping a vibrant and future-focused school culture.

She has led the implementation of Subject Disciplinary Literacies (SDL) with vision and precision, delivering a rigorous four-day professional development program that built a shared understanding and consistent practice across Years 7–12. Her support has extended beyond training, with classroom walkthroughs, coaching and hands-on assistance in planning, helping staff embed SDL strategies into everyday teaching. Her efforts have earned the school recognition as a Lexis Education Certified School, a testament to her dedication and expertise.

Through regular classroom observations, Kate provides thoughtful mentoring and feedback, helping refine instructional practices while fostering trust and respect. She leads with a collaborative spirit, celebrating the strengths and successes of her colleagues through personalised notes, emails and acknowledgements at morning briefings.

Teaching and learning are at the heart of her vision, reflected in her Bridge Action Plan focused on improving NAPLAN and external results. Her belief in education as a collective effort is evident in the strong partnerships she builds with families, recognising their vital role in student success.
